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

The New-York World.

For the first time in its history, *The World* can congratulate the Democrats of the UNITED STATES upon a solid victory won. During the last twelve years its annual message to readers and friends throughout the country has appealed to the indomitable faith and hope which have survived every disaster, to the courage which has renewed upon the morrow of every defeat an unflinching fight for the principles dear to every Democratic heart, and necessary to the peace and prosperity of the Republic. At last a great victory has been won; not in a single State only, but in a majority of States, the greatest and the least, North, South, East, and West.

For under the guidance of a wise statesmanship and with increasing unanimity, the *new* Democracy is rising to meet the great exigencies in which are formed great parties. Learning of the *old* Democracy the secret of its strength and its protracted sway, the new Democracy is making sound economic issues against the much more monstrous evils of our time.

These evils are three, the fountains of all the rest.

1. The Currency, a public debt made legal tender for private debts, failed paper of increasing amount and fluctuating value, not convertible with coin, displacing the currency of the world's commerce, cheating buyer or seller in every act of exchange, defrauding our Farmers and Planters of the due reward of their toil.

2. The Tariff, contrived by protected monopolists to increase the prices and force the sale of their own commodities, instead of raising the largest revenue for the Treasury with the least burden to the people.

3. The Centralizing and usurping by the Federal Administration of powers distributed by the Constitution to the States or reserved by the people.

Assaulting the Republican citadel, at one or another of these, its weakest points, the onset of the Democracy has been irresistible. And where the Flag of

HARD MONEY, FREE TRADE, AND HOME RULE

has been lifted highest it has been carried farthest, as in the State of New-York, where GRANT'S majority of 50,000 in 1872 has been submerged under a Democratic majority of 50,000 in 1874.

But the Waterloo of Imperialism is still to be fought and won. The Democratic House of Representatives of the 44th Congress will be crippled by the veto of a Republican Senate and a Republican President.

The Chief Magistracy, both Houses of the 45th Congress, and the power to restore prosperity to forty-four millions of freemen are the prizes of the elections of 1876.

Shall the revolution go on? The great exigency calls for a great party. To discern a people's deepest interests and needs, and to meet them with the resources of a competent and high statesmanship, is the surest way to obtain and the only way to keep the trust of a people's power.

A career as long and illustrious as that in which the party led by Jefferson upheld the liberties of citizens and the Union of States with equal hands, awaits the rejuvenated Democracy if now, as then, rising to the height of their great opportunity, they shall assure to the nation its deliverance from these fiscal barbarisms and these imperial politics. To this hope and triumph, *The World* dedicates its utmost energy and all its powers.

To the Democrats of the UNITED STATES we appeal for the means of success. We ask no profit. We only ask a larger field of usefulness. Will not 80,000 volunteer Democrats outdo the 80,000 Federal office-holders, by multiplying the readers, and thus enlarging the influence of the Democratic Press?

NOTE.—In the table above, it is to be understood that the word "near" and the character ☽ (conjunction) are synonymous, and mean that the two bodies are nearest each other at the time expressed, and that they are then on a line running from the North Pole through both bodies, and have the same right ascension. GR. ELON. means greatest elongation, or greatest apparent angular distance from the SUN. The character ☽ indicates that the planet is opposite the Sun, or 180 degs., or half a circle east of it, and rises when the Sun sets, and sets when he rises. When a planet is a quarter of a circle, or 90 degs. from the Sun, east or west, it is known by ☉. These are the signs of the planets: ☉ the Sun; ☾ the Moon; ☿ Mercury; ♀ Venus; ⊕ the Earth; ♃ Mars; ♃ Jupiter; ♄ Saturn; ♅ Uranus; ♆ Neptune.

Eclipses.

There will be two Eclipses this year :

I. A Total Eclipse of the Sun, April 6. Invisible in the United States.

II. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, September 29. Visible east of the Mississippi River as a Partial Eclipse, the Sun rising eclipsed. Also in Africa and South-western Europe. The Eclipse will be annular or ring-like from Sodus Point, on the south shore of Lake Ontario, Lyons, Oswego, Syracuse, Utica, Saratoga, and Northern Massachusetts to the ocean. Along the central line the size of the Eclipse will be $1\frac{1}{4}$ digits.

March 10.—New-Hampshire election. The Democratic candidate for Governor had a plurality of the votes cast, and there was a Democratic majority in the Legislature.

March 18.—In consequence of the death of Governor Hart, of Florida, Lieutenant-Governor M. L. Stearns became Governor.

April 2.—Rhode Island election. Republican State ticket and Legislature elected. The Democrats made no nominations.

April 7.—Connecticut election. The Democratic State ticket and a Democratic majority in the Legislature were elected.

April 17.—William B. Washburn was elected United States Senator from Massachusetts, to fill the late Senator Sumner's unexpired term; the vote in the Legislature being, on the 33d and final ballot, Washburn, 151; Curtis, 64; Dawes, 26; Loring, 4; Banks, 4; Wendell Phillips, 1; John G. Whittier, 1; Gifford, 1.

May 7.—Reunion of prominent Democrats from all parts of the Union at the Manhattan Club, New-York.

May 19.—William W. Eaton was elected United States Senator from Connecticut; the vote in the Legislature being, Eaton, 148; Buckingham, 80; Ingersoll, 4; Harrison, 3; David A. Wells, 1.

June 1.—Oregon election. The Democratic State ticket and candidate for Representative in Congress were elected. An opposition majority was chosen to the Legislature.

June 30.—Arkansas constitutional election. There was a majority of 71,551 in favor of calling a convention to revise the constitution. All of the counties except two elected Democratic delegates.

July 11.—In consequence of the death of Governor Caldwell, of North-Carolina, Lieutenant-Governor C. H. Brogden became Governor.

Aug. 3.—Kentucky election. Democratic candidate for Clerk of the Court of Appeals elected.

Aug. 3.—Utah election. George Q. Cannon, Mormon, was elected to Congress.

Aug. 3.—Tennessee county elections resulted in large Democratic majorities.

Aug. 6.—North-Carolina election. Democratic State ticket elected. Of the 8 Congressmen elected, all but one were Democrats.

Aug. 18.—Ohio constitutional election. The new constitution was voted down by a majority of 147,284.

Aug. 19.—The Pennsylvania Republican State Convention pronounced in favor of Governor Hartranft for the next Presidency.

Sept. 1.—Vermont election. Republican State ticket, Legislature, and two Congressmen elected. In the second Congressional district, there was no choice, Luke P. Poland being defeated.

Sept. 8.—South-Carolina Republican State Convention pronounced in favor of a third term for President Grant.

Sept. 14.—Maine election. Republican Governor, Legislature, and five Representatives in Congress elected.

Sept. 17.—New-York Democratic State Convention nominated Samuel J. Tilden for Governor. The vote stood, Tilden, 252; Parker, 126; Robinson, 6; McQuade, 2. The nomination was then made unanimous. Hard money, Free-Trade, and Home Rule platform unanimously adopted.

Oct. 13.—Indiana, Iowa, Nebraska, Ohio, and West-Virginia elections. The Democrats carried Indiana and Ohio, electing their State tickets and a majority of the Congressmen. The Republicans carried Iowa and Nebraska, electing their State tickets and a majority of the Congressmen. In West-Virginia, three Democratic Congressmen were elected.

Oct. 13.—Arkansas State election. The new constitution was adopted by 53,800 majority, and the Democratic State ticket was elected without opposition.

Oct. 13.—Convention of Southern carpet-baggers at Chattanooga. A permanent "Outrage" Committee was appointed.

Oct. 23.—George F. Edmunds re-elected United States Senator from Vermont.

Nov. 2.—Election in Louisiana. Democratic State ticket and majority of Congressmen elected.

Nov. 3.—Elections in twenty-three States and three territories. Democratic State tickets were elected in Alabama, Delaware, Missouri, New-Jersey, New-York, Pennsylvania, and Tennessee; and a Democratic majority of Congressmen in Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware, Illinois, Kentucky, Maryland, Massachusetts, Missouri, New-Jersey, New-York, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Texas, and Virginia. In Massachusetts, the Democrats elected the Governor, and the Republicans the remainder of the State ticket. In Illinois, the opposition elected the Superintendent of Schools, and the Republicans the State Treasurer. Republican State tickets were elected in Kansas, Michigan, and South-Carolina, and a Republican majority of Congressmen in Florida, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Nevada, Rhode Island, South-Carolina, and Wisconsin. In Vermont, a Republican Congressman was chosen, Mr. Poland again being beaten.

Platform of the New-York Democracy,

ADOPTED BY THE CONVENTION OF THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY OF THE STATE OF NEW-YORK, AT SYRACUSE, SEPTEMBER 16, 1874.

5. Home Rule: to limit and localize most jealously the few powers intrusted to public servants—municipal, State, and Federal: no centralization.

8. Free men: a uniform excise law; no sumptuary laws.

9. Official accountability enforced by better civil and criminal remedies: no private use of public funds by public officers.

10. Corporations chartered by the State always supervisable by the State in the interest of the people.

12. The Presidency a public trust, not a private prerogative: no third term.

13. Economy in the public expense, that labor may be lightly burdened.

For 1872, the vote returned by the regular (Warren) Board of Canvassers is given for Louisiana, and that returned by the Secretary of State of Arkansas for that State. The number of citizens in the several States, entitled to vote, according to the census of 1870, was 8,307,305. The actual vote in 1872 was 6,457,315, and therefore, allowing for the increase in population in two years, it is evident that over 2,000,000 citizens entitled to vote did not vote for President in November, 1872. The whole number of electoral votes is 366. Necessary to a choice, 184.

In an election held in this State, in July, 1874, to decide whether a Convention should be called to revise the Constitution, the vote was: For the Convention, 80,016; against the Convention, 8,465; majority for the Convention, 71,551. All of the counties in the State, except two, elected Democrats as delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

In an election held in October, 1874, the new Constitution was ratified by the people (the vote in detail is given above), and the Democratic ticket for State officers elected without opposition. A. H. Garland, for Governor, received 76,871 votes, and the vote received by the other candidates on the ticket, did not vary much from this.

The election for Representatives in the Forty-fourth Congress was held in November, 1874.

Rates of Postage.

All domestic mail matter must be prepaid by postage-stamps. There is no franking privilege, and no "free" mail matter except newspapers (one copy each) sent to subscribers within the county where published, and not delivered through letter-carrier offices. All letters received in the office with stamps cut from stamped envelopes, or with such postage-stamps as were in use prior to 1861, or with revenue stamps on them, are treated as "unmailable," and sent to the Dead-Letter Office. Departmental postage is prepaid by special stamps, prepared and furnished by the Post-Office Department. Letters deposited in city lamp-post boxes must have the requisite number of stamps before placing them therein. Depositing money in the boxes does not insure their being prepaid. Newspapers are not taken at city lamp-post boxes. A letter on which one full rate of postage is prepaid, but on which further postage is chargeable, will be forwarded, when deposited in a post-office, and the deficient postage at single rates collected on delivery. If the postage is left wholly unpaid, or is prepaid less than one full rate, it will be "held for postage" and sent to the Dead-Letter Office. Should it reach its destination by inadvertence, however, it will be charged with double postage on delivery, with allowance of any amount less than one full rate which has been prepaid thereon. "One full rate" means, in the case of mail letters, three cents. All matter other than letters, must be fully prepaid, or it will not be forwarded except possibly by inadvertence, in which case double postage will be collected on its delivery. The following are the rates payable on the different classes of domestic mail matter:

FIRST CLASS.

On letters, sealed packages, mail matter wholly or partly in writing (except book manuscripts and corrected proof-sheets passing between authors and publishers, and except local, or "drop" letters); on all printed matter so marked as to convey any other or further informa-

tion than is conveyed by the original print (except the correction of typographical errors); on all matter not otherwise chargeable with letter postage, but which is so wrapped or secured that it can not be conveniently examined by postmasters without destroying the wrapper or envelope; on all newspapers, magazines, and periodicals sent from publishers to subscribers and inclosing any article whatever except bona-fide supplements or bills and receipts for subscriptions; and on all packages of matter not in itself chargeable with letter postage, but in which is inclosed or concealed any letter or other thing chargeable with letter postage, 3 cents for each half-ounce or fraction thereof, weight of packages limited to four pounds. On local or "drop" letters, at offices where free delivery by carriers is established, 2 cents for each half-ounce or fraction thereof, weight of packages limited to four pounds. On local or "drop" letters, at offices where free delivery by carriers is not established, 1 cent per half-ounce or fraction thereof, weight of packages limited to four pounds.

SECOND CLASS.

On newspapers sent to regular subscribers from a known office of publication, or by newsdealers to other newsdealers, 2 cents per pound. On magazines and periodicals sent to regular subscribers from a known office of publication, or by newsdealers to other newsdealers, 3 cents per pound. These rates are payable by the publisher or newsdealer at the office of mailing, and at the time the matter is deposited in the post-office. Postage on printed matter to Canada and other British North-American Provinces can be prepaid only to the boundary-line—the rates being the same as on domestic matter of the same kind.

THIRD CLASS.

[Packages of mailable matter of this class must be prepaid by stamps, and must not exceed the weight prescribed by law (which is four pounds); and any package exceeding that

weight will be excluded as unmailable.] On books, pamphlets, occasional publications, transient newspapers, magazines, and periodicals; hand-bills, posters, sheet-music, unsealed circulars, prospectuses, book manuscripts and proof-sheets; cards, maps, lithographs, prints, chromo-lithographs and engravings; seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, and scions; flexible patterns; samples of ores, metals, minerals, and merchandise; dry articles of merchandise (samples or not); sample cards, phonographic paper, letter envelopes, postal envelopes and wrappers, plain and ornamental paper, photographs, and all other articles for which other rates of postage are not prescribed in this table, and which are not by law excluded from the mails, 1 cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof, weight of packages limited to *four pounds*. On unsealed circulars, newspapers (whether transient or addressed to regular subscribers—excepting *weekly* papers, which may be mailed to subscribers on prepayment of postage at second-class rates), and on periodicals not exceeding two ounces in weight, when any of the same are *deposited in a letter-carrier office* for delivery by the office or its carriers, 1 cent each. On periodicals exceeding two ounces in weight, when *deposited in a letter-carrier office* for delivery by the office or its carriers, 2 cents each.

POSTAL CARDS

may be procured at any post-office, at a cost of 1 cent each. The message, etc., must be always written on the *back* of the card. If any thing but the address is written on the *face*, letter postage must be paid by stamps, or the card will not be forwarded. Nothing whatever must be *attached* to the card. Postal cards will be *forwarded* from one office to another, in case of removal of the person addressed, but will in no case be returned to writer, nor sent to Dead-Letter Office, nor advertised.

DOMESTIC MONEY ORDERS

are issued at any money-order post-office in the United States, payable at any other money-order post-office, in sums of not more than fifty dollars. Larger amounts can be sent to the same person by additional orders. **RATES:** On orders not exceeding \$10, 5 cents; over \$10 and not exceeding \$20, 10 cents; over \$20 and not exceeding \$30, 15 cents; over \$30 and not exceeding \$40, 20 cents; over \$40 and not exceeding \$50, 25 cents.

FOREIGN MONEY ORDERS.

At the principal money-order post-offices in the United States (including all the larger post-offices), money orders, payable at money-order post-offices in Great Britain, Ireland, and Switzerland, may be procured at the following rates: On orders not exceeding \$10, 25 cents; over \$10 and not exceeding \$20, 50 cents; over \$20 and not exceeding \$30, 75 cents; over \$30 and not exceeding \$40, \$1; over \$40 and not exceeding \$50, \$1.25. Orders can also be obtained on Germany at the following rates: On orders not exceeding \$5, 15 cents; over \$5 and not exceeding \$10, 25 cents; over \$10 and not exceeding \$20, 50 cents; over \$20 and not exceeding \$30, 75 cents; over \$30 and not exceeding \$40, \$1; over \$40 and not exceeding \$50, \$1.25.

UNCLAIMED LETTERS.

All letters remaining uncalled for thirty days in a post-office after being advertised, are sent to the Dead-Letter Office, except letters bearing

a request to return to the writer if not called for within a specified time, and letters bearing the name and address of the writer on the outside. Such letters are returned direct to the writers without advertising. The use of "request" envelopes is recommended to the public.

FORWARDING LETTERS FREE.

Prepaid and free letters are forwarded from one post-office to another, at the request of the persons addressed, without additional postage. But a letter which has been once delivered to an authorized person can not be remailed to a new address without the prepayment of additional postage. Drop-letters, when forwarded by mail to another post-office, must be prepaid at 3 cents per half-ounce. No mail matter, except letters or postal cards can be forwarded to a new address except on prepayment of postage by stamps at regular rates.

REGISTERED LETTERS.

Letters can be registered to any part of the United States and Territories on payment of a registration fee of 8 cents; to Great Britain, Ireland, Germany, Italy, Switzerland, Holland, West-Indies, and Panama, on the payment of a fee of 8 cents; to Canada, Nova Scotia, New-Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island, on payment of a fee of 5 cents; and to the principal countries of Europe, and certain ports and cities of Asia and Africa, on payment of fees varying from 8 to 17 cents. All registration fees must be paid by stamps, and the postage on all registered letters must also be prepaid in full by stamps. The public are desired by the Post-office never to send money or valuable articles in unregistered letters. Postmasters at all post-offices are obliged to register letters and packages when requested to do so.

FOREIGN POSTAGE.

For letters not over half an ounce to Austria, 6 cents; Belgium, 6 cents; Canada, 6 cents; France, 9 cents; Germany, 6 cents; Great Britain, 6 cents; Italy, 10 cents; Netherlands, 6 cents; Russia, 10 cents; Spain, 12 cents; Sweden, 10 cents; Switzerland, 10 cents.

[POSTAL CARDS may be sent to Canada, Newfoundland, Germany, and Switzerland. A one-cent adhesive postage-stamp must be affixed to each postal card so sent, in addition to the one-cent stamp already printed thereon.]

SUGGESTIONS TO THE PUBLIC.

All mail matter should be plainly and fully directed. In addition to the town or city and State, the name of the *county* should be added, if known; though the latter is not necessary in the case of matter for New-York, Chicago, or other large cities.

All mail matter for large cities should be directed to the street and number of the person or firm addressed, or to box number. Letters for large cities addressed to transient residents, and intended "to be called for," should be so marked.

Postage-stamps should be affixed to the upper right-hand corners of letters, and the use of envelopes of dark colors or fanciful forms should be avoided. Sealing-wax should not be used on mail matter in hot weather, nor at any time on letters directed to tropical countries.

Letters are sometimes "held for postage" in consequence of the failure of the stamps to adhere after the letters have been mailed. This

difficulty can be avoided by taking care to wet moderately *both sides* of the stamps.

Glass, liquids, poisons, and explosive materials are excluded from the mails by law, and, if deposited in a post-office, will not be forwarded. Make all reports of missing letters, etc., in writing, giving all particulars as to date, office

where mailed, and direction in full. If possible, inclose a *fac-simile* of the envelope used, addressed in the same handwriting. Cases of serious or repeated loss or delay should be reported to the "Second Assistant Postmaster-General, Washington, D. C.;" ordinary cases, to the local postmaster.

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

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
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
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
