

father, Thomas Alvord, who received it from the General Court of Mass., for services rendered in the Indian War by Thomas Alvord, grandfather of the present Thomas Alvord who now disposes of the land.

"To all People to whom these presents shall Come. Greeting: Know ye that I; Thomas Alvord of Middletown, in the Co. of Hartford and Colony of Conn. in New England for the consideration of fifty pounds lawful money received to my full satisfaction of Seth Smith of Suffield of said county aforesaid do give, grant, bargain, sell and confirm unto the said Smith his heirs and assigns forever a full grant of land lying in Fallstown or Bernardstown—the Houselot No. 58. with all after drafts belonging to the whole grant; and also the after grant commonly called the Gore in the Co. of Hampshire and Province of Massachusetts Bay, New England aforesaid which was granted by the General Assembly of sd Province to my Hon-d Father, Thos. Alvord of Middletown aforesaid as Eldest Male Heir of his Hon-d Father, Thos. Alvord, late of Northampton Dec-d.

JONATHAN ALVORD (*Thomas, Thomas, Alexander*), born Northampton, Mass., Nov. 16, 1711; died Winchester, Conn., June 28, 1784; married 1st, Oct. 16, 1739, Elizabeth Sanford, daughter of Samuel and Hannah (Baldwin) Sanford. She was born Milford, Conn., Dec. 13, 1716; died East Hampton, Conn., Apr. 7, 1764. He married 2nd, East Hampton, Conn., Nov. 21, 1765, Mrs. Mary (Smith) Brainard, daughter of Ralph and Mary (Mayo) Smith, and widow of Timothy Brainard. Res. Chatham (East Hampton), Conn. Children:

Jonathan Alvord settled in that part of Middletown known as East Hampton and possibly lived also in what is now Middlefield.

In Oct., 1748, he was commissioned Lieut. of the 17th Co., 6th Reg. of Conn., and was Captain in the same regiment and company June, 1753.

In 1770 he removed to Winchester, Conn., and lived in a house long since taken down, near where the dugway road turns west to Winchester Center. There he lived until he sold to Joshua Knapp in 1773.

His farm of thirty acres in East Hampton, Conn., he sold Jan. 19, 1770, before his removal to Winchester to Nehemiah Gates for 120 pounds lawful money.
