

Rev. War Service: "Alvord, Job, Captain, Col. William Shepard's Reg., Continental Army, pay accounts for service from Jan. 1, 1777, to Mar. 1, 1779. Reported a supernumerary Mar. 1, (also given Apr. 1,) 1779. Also muster roll dated Camp at Valley Forge, May 1, 1778. Also muster rolls for Oct., Nov., and Dec., 1778 and Mar. and Apr., 1779, dated Providence. Also Col. Seth Murray's Hampshire Co. Reg. Enlisted July 4, 1780, dis. Oct. 10, 1780; service, 3mo. 15 days; enlistment 3 months. Company raised to re-enforce Continental Army." (Mass. Soldiers in Rev.)

68. NATHAN ALVORD (*John, Thomas, Alexander*), born South Hadley, Mass.; died probably at Brookfield, Vt.; married 1st, South Hadley, Mass., Jan. 15, 1756, Lydia White. He married 2nd, Hadley, Mass., Sept. 16, 1784 (int.), Mrs. Mary Marshall, widow of John Marshall. Res. South Hadley, Mass., and Brookfield, Vt. Children:

March 20, 1752, Nathan Alvord received from his father, John Alvord, a grant of land in South Hadley, Mass.

Sept. 25, 1752, Nathan Alvord of Hadley, husbandman, conveyed to his brother, Gad Alvord of Hadley, tanner, land in South Precinct, and in bounding, says: "From the Southwest Corner of a lot of land, which my Hon-d Father (Mr. John Alvord) conveyed to sd. Gad Alvord on the twentieth day of March last past; and said line from sd. Southwest Corner, runs to Connecticut River then extends Northwardly on the bank of sd. River," etc.

Sept. 9, 1761, Nathan Alvord of Windsor, Conn., husbandman, conveyed land upon the Conn. River in South Hadley, Mass., to Ebenezer Hunt of Northampton, Mass.

Nathan Alvord was a member of a committee on Revolutionary matters at South Hadley 1774-78. He was appointed administrator on the estate of Moses White of South Hadley in 1783, from which it may be inferred that his wife Lydia White belonged to this family, though the records fail to disclose it. With his wife Mary he deeded land in South Hadley in 1789, and must have moved to Brookfield, Vt., at this time, since U. S. census for 1790 makes him a resident of that town, during that year, as well as ten years later, when he and his wife were living in the same house with no family. His second wife brought her church letter from Ipswich, Mass., in 1786 to
