The Bradford Family

1588-1897



William Bradford

Born in Austerfield, Yorkshire, England, 1588; baptized March 19, 1590. Son of William and Alice Hanson Bradford, and a kinsman of John Bradford, prebend of St. Paul's, London, who was burned at the stake in the reign of Bloody Mary.

Joined the community emigrating to Holland in 1608, and grew to a position of influence among his associates.

Embarked from Delftshaven, Holland, July 22, 1620; joined other Pilgrim colonists on the "Mayflower" at Southampton, England. The colonists arrived in Cape Cod Bay, Nov. 22, 1620, and founded Plymouth, Mass., Dec. 21, 1620.

Governor of Plymouth Colony from April 21, 1621, until his death in 1657, excepting 1633, 1634, 1636, 1638, and 1644, when he declined election.

His numerous writings have proved of great value to chroniclers and historians. The manuscript of his principal work, "The History of Plimouth Plantation," was lost for many years, but in 1846 was found in the Bishop of London's library at Fulham. Upon the petition of the United States Ambassador, the Consistory Court of the Diocese of London, sitting at St. Paul's, March 25, 1897, ordered that the manuscript be delivered to the Ambassador for transmission to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Ambassador Bayard brought it to Boston, where it was formally delivered by him to the Governor, May 26, 1897.

Married Dorothy, daughter of John May, in Amsterdam, Holland, Nov. 30, 1613. She was born in Wisbeach, England, in 1597, and was drowned in Cape Cod Bay, Dec. 7, 1620.

Born in Plymouth, Mass., June 17, 1624.

Major in Indian Wars. Commander-in-Chief of Plymouth forces in King Philip's war. Deputy Governor of Plymouth Colony from 1682 to 1686, and from 1689 to 1691. Member of Sir Edmund Andros's Council, 1687, 1688.

Married Alice, daughter of Thomas Richards, of Weymouth, Mass., 1652. She died Dec.

12, 1671. They lived in Kingston, Mass.

Born in Kingston, Mass., May 9, 1662.

Married Joshua Ripley, of Hingham, Mass., Nov. 28, 1682. He was born May 9, 1658, and died May 8, 1739.

They removed to Norwich, Conn., Oct. 10, 1688, and thence to Windham, Conn., March 23, 1691, where Joshua Ripley became one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for Windham County. She was the first, and for a long time the only, physician in the settlement.

The Brewster Family

1559-1897

Elder William Brewster

Born in England in 1559-60.

He was matriculated at Peterhouse College, Cambridge University, Dec. 3, 1580. After leaving the University he entered into the service of William Davison, Queen Elizabeth's ambassador to Scotland and Holland, who found him so capable and faithful that he reposed the utmost confidence in him. While negotiating with the United Provinces, Davison intrusted him with the keys of Flushing; and the States of Holland, in recognition of his merit, presented him with a golden chain. When, in 1587, Davison incurred the displeasure of the Queen, Brewster remained his steadfast friend.

Held the office of Post of Scrooby from 1590 to 1607, succeeding his father. It was then an office under appointment from the

government, and not, as afterward, an employment for the accommodation of the public. While holding his official position he occupied the Manor House at Scrooby, which had been the residence of archbishops and royalty. In September, 1607, he resigned his office.

Not agreeing with the forms of the Established Church, he withdrew from its communion, and united with Rev. Richard Clifton and Rev. John Robinson. The newly formed society met on the Sabbath at his house. During the year 1608 this Non-conformist society left England for Leyden, Holland.

Lived in Leyden until 1620, and engaged there with Thomas Brewer in publishing ecclesiastical treatises. These publications enraged King James I, through whose influence Brewer was imprisoned, and Brewster's liberty was frequently imperilled.

Sailed on the "Mayflower" for America in 1620. He held a prominent position in the new colony, and, with Bradford, Winslow, Alden, and others, founded religious and civil government in this country. He left an excellent library for that day. The whole number of volumes was 275, of which 64 were in the learned languages.

Married his wife, Mary, in England. She accom-

panied him on the "Mayflower," and died in Plymouth, March, 1624.

The Alden Family

1599-1897

John Alden

Born in England in 1599.

Came to America in the "Mayflower" in 1620, and became a prominent member of the Plymouth Colony.

Appointed Assistant to the Governor in 1633, which office he held for nearly his entire life, serving all of the Governors of the Old Colony except the first. He was one of the original proprietors of Bridgewater, Mass.

He removed to Duxbury, and represented that town from 1641 to 1649.

In 1653 and the seven succeeding years he was one of the Council of War appointed in view of danger from the Indians.

He was distinguished for a holy life and great integrity, and has been honored by all succeeding generations.

Married, about 1622, Priscilla, daughter of William Molines.

John, born in Plymouth, about 1623.

Removed to Duxbury when very young; went from Duxbury to Boston in 1659; lived on what is now Alden Street, Boston; was captain of several armed vessels of the Colony; married, 1st, Elizabeth——; 2d, Elizabeth Everill, a widow, April 1, 1660, who died 1719; died March 14, 1702.

Joseph, born in Duxbury about 1624;

married Mary, daughter of Moses Simmonds, received his father's proprietary share in Bridgewater, Mass., and was an early settler there in 1654; died Feb. 8, 1697.

Elizabeth, born before May, 1625; mar-

ried Dec. 18, 1644, William Paybody, of Duxbury; about 1684 they removed to Little Compton, R. I.; died at Little Compton, May 31, 1717.

Jonathan, born about 1627 in Duxbury;

a captain; married Abigail, daughter of Andrew Hallet, of Barnstable, Dec. 10, 1672, who died Aug. 17, 1725; inherited and occupied the paternal estate; died Feb., 1697.

Sarah, born ——; married Alexander,

eldest son of Captain Miles Standish, of Duxbury.

Ruth, born ^{1634/5} — ; married John, son of Deacon Samuel Bass, of Braintree, Mass., Feb. 3, 1657; died Oct. 12, 1674.

Born in Duxbury, 1646.

The first house in Windham had been built in 1689, and Joshua Ripley was the first Town Clerk and Treasurer, also Justice of the Peace. The inscriptions on the gravestones over his grave and his wife's grave are: "Here
"lies peacefully interred the body of
"Joshua Ripley, Esq., one of His Most
"Worshipful Majesty's Justices of the
"Peace for the County of Windham.
"Died May 8, 1739."

"Here lies interred the body of that
"most worthy, and virtuous, and most
"ingenuous gentlewoman, Mrs. Hannah
"B. Ripley, the well-beloved consort of
"Joshua Ripley, Esq., who after she had
"led a lovely and eventful life fell asleep
"in Jesus, May 28, 1738, in ye 76th year
"of her age."

The Seabury Family

1673-1897

It is said that their ancestors lived in Portlake, Devonshire, England, and that the original form of their surname was Sedborough.

Deacon John Seabury

Born in 1673. From Duxbury, Mass., he went to Connecticut just before 1700. He settled first in Stonington, and in 1704 removed to Groton, Conn., where, shortly after, he was chosen a deacon in the Congregational Church.

Married Elizabeth, daughter of David Alden, Dec. 9, 1697. She died Jan. 4, 1771, aged 94. She was buried at Stonington, and is said to have lived to see the fourth generation of her descendants.

Sarah, born in Groton, Conn., March 16, 1711.

Nathaniel, born in Groton, Conn., July 31, 1720.

Died at Hempstead in N. Y., Dec. 17, 1759.

Rev. Samuel Seabury

Born in Groton, Conn., July 8, 1706. He graduated from Harvard College in 1724, and in 1726 settled in North Groton, Conn., as a Congregational minister. In 1730 he declared himself a convert to the Church of England; and in 1731 went to England, where he received Episcopal ordination

from the Bishop of London. In 1732 he was appointed by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts as its missionary to take charge of St. James's Church at New London. He remained in New London about eleven years, and in 1743 was transferred by the Society to Hempstead, N. Y., on Long Island, where he officiated over the church for twenty-one years, and died there June 15, 1764.

Married, 1st, Abigail, daughter of Thomas Mumford, of North Groton, Conn., She died in 1731.

Married, 2d, May 27, 1733, Elizabeth, daughter of Adam Powell, of Newport, R. I. She died Feb. 6, 1799. She had six children.

Rev. Samuel Seabury, D.D.

Born in New London, Conn., Nov. 30, 1729.

Removed to Hempstead, N. Y., in 1742.

Graduated from Yale College in 1748 ; and in 1751 went to Scotland for the purpose of studying medicine. Turning his attention to theology, he took orders in the Church of England, and on his return settled in New Brunswick.

In 1756 he removed to the church of Jamaica, N. Y., and thence, in 1766, he went to West Chester, N. Y., where he was rector of the church, and kept a classical school until the British entered New York in 1776. Then, being a Royalist, he took refuge in that city until 1783.

In 1784 he was recommended by the Episcopal clergy of Connecticut and New York for consecration as Bishop of Connecticut. He went to Scotland for the purpose of consecration, as the English archbishop was fearful of giving offense to the Americans, and he was there consecrated at Aberdeen Nov. 14, 1784, by Bishops Kilgour, Petrie, and Skinner. The same year he returned to Connecticut, the first Bishop of the North American Continent. He settled in New London, presiding over the diocese of Connecticut, and in 1790 was elected Bishop of Rhode Island.

Married Oct. 12, 1756, Mary, daughter of Edward Hicks, of New York. She died Oct. 12, 1780.

Died Feb. 25, 1796.
