**Summary:** Municipal government official, civic leader, and postmaster from Springfield, Illinois. Correspondence with Charles A. Lindbergh, speeches and writings, publications, photographs, and memorabilia relating to Lindbergh's cross-country airmail route which included service to Springfield, Illinois, and his flight of 1927 from New York to Paris. Includes a philatelic cover which Lindbergh carried aboard the *Spirit of St. Louis* on his trans-Atlantic flight and mailed to Conkling from Paris.

## Scope and Content Note

The papers of William H. Conkling (1858-1939) span the years 1864-1976, with the bulk of the papers dated 1927-1939. Conkling, longtime postal official in Springfield, Illinois, was an early airmail enthusiast who established his city as a stop on one of the first cross-country contract airmail routes. The route was flown by Charles A. Lindbergh until 1927, when he quit to prepare for his historic New York-to-Paris flight. During this flight, Lindbergh carried aboard his aircraft, the *Spirit of St. Louis*, a philatelic cover which he mailed to Conkling from Paris. In addition to this cover, Conkling's papers contain correspondence with Lindbergh; publications, speeches, and writings concerning Lindbergh's Paris flight and airmail service to Springfield; and photographs of Lindbergh loading his plane with mail at Springfield's aerodrome and as its special guest of honor.

5. Silk ribbon, "Welcome Home—Charles A. Lindbergh—St. Louis Committee—June 17, 18, 19, 1927." 1 item.

### Philatelic Covers

1. Philatelic cover carried aboard the "Spirit of St. Louis" airplane by Charles Lindbergh on his flight from New York to Paris, addressed to William H. Conkling, postmaster, Springfield, Illinois, signed and verified by Charles Lindbergh. Mailed in an outer envelope on which is imprinted "Embassy of the United States of America" and postmarked May 28, 1927, Paris. 2 items.
2. Philatelic cover commemorating the dedication of the Abraham Lincoln tomb in Springfield, Ill., June 17, 1931. Postmarked Springfield, same date. 1 item.
