The papers of Gilbert M. Hitchcock, United States senator and newspaper publisher from Nebraska, were given by Mrs. Gilbert M. Hitchcock in 1941. Additional material was purchased in 1944.

Part of the collection was microfilmed circa 1950. The papers were expanded in 1984, and the finding aid was revised in 2009.

Scope and Content Note

The papers of Gilbert Monell Hitchcock (1859-1934) span the years 1910-1935 and consist of correspondence, memoranda, reports, and printed material pertaining to Hitchcock's service as United States senator from Nebraska. Subjects include his role as chairman of the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations and relations between President Woodrow Wilson and Congress, especially during the fight over the peace treaty in the Senate, 1919-1920. Included is Hitchcock's correspondence with Wilson and Edith Bolling Galt Wilson on behalf of her husband. Other correspondents include Newton Diehl Baker, Robert Lansing, and William H. Taft.
