**Summary:** Correspondence, research notes, writings, bibliographies, reports, minutes, and other records relating primarily to the commission's publication of *Lincoln Day by Day* compiled by William E. Baringer and C. Percy Powell under the editorship of Earl Schenck Miers. Also includes indexes relating to the commission's bibliography project.

## Administrative Information

### Provenance

The records of the U.S. Lincoln Sesquicentennial Commission Office of the Research Director were given to the Library of Congress by the commission in 1960.

### Processing History

The records of the U.S. Lincoln Sesquicentennial Commission Office of the Research Director were arranged and described in 1963. The finding aid was revised in 2008.

### Copyright Status

The status of copyright in the unpublished writings in the U.S. Lincoln Sesquicentennial Commission Office of the Research Director is governed by the Copyright Law of the United States (Title 17, U.S.C.).

### Access and Restrictions

The records of the Lincoln Sesquicentennial Commission are open to research. Researchers are advised to contact the Manuscript Reading Room prior to visiting. Many collections are stored off-site and advance notice is needed to retrieve these items for research use.

## Organizational History

The Abraham Lincoln Sesquicentennial Commission was established by a Joint Resolution of September 2, 1957 (71 Stat. 587) authorizing the establishment of the commission “in order to provide for appropriate and nation-wide observances and the coordination of ceremonies” to mark the one-hundred-fiftieth anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln.

The Lincoln Sesquicentennial Commission, composed of twenty-eight members (three ex officio, one statutory, and twenty-four appointive), held its first meeting on December 11, 1957. The commission employed an executive director and his assistant and supporting staff to conduct research and prepare material essential to a commemoration of Lincoln’s birth. Staff included John Sherman Cooper, chairman; William E. Baringer, executive director; and his assistant, John E. Allen.

## Scope and Content Note

The records of the United States Lincoln Sesquicentennial Commission Office of the Research Director consist of the files of Research Director C. Percy Powell and the records of William E. Baringer in connection with his work on the manuscript of *Lincoln Day-by-Day*. The collection spans the period 1809-1965, with the bulk of the material from 1960. The papers are organized in three series: [\*Lincoln Day-by-Day\*](#), [\*Lincoln Bibliography Project\*](#), and [\*Miscellany\*](#).

The bulk of the records consist of holograph and typewritten drafts, printer’s copy, and a few page proofs of the manuscript of the three-volume work compiled by Baringer and Powell under the general editorship of Earl Schenck Miers entitled *Lincoln Day-by-Day* (Washington, D.C.: Lincoln Sesquicentennial Commission, 1960). Of particular significance is the extensive file of research notes from primary to secondary sources that document the chronology of Lincoln’s life. Only about half of these were cited in the printed work.

The office of the research director was also engaged in compiling a bibliography of all publications concerning Lincoln published since the appearance of a bibliography by Jay Monaghan in 1943-1945 (*Lincoln Bibliography*, 1839-1939, 2 vols., Springfield, Ill., Illinois State Historical Library, 1943-1945). The series relating to the bibliography project, which was not completed, consists of card indexes by title and author to publications appearing between 1939 and 1959.

[\*Miscellany\*](#) consists of the research director’s office files. Included are copies of records, reports, and minutes of the commission, correspondence with leaders and groups concerned with Abraham Lincoln, including the Lincoln Group of the District of Columbia, the Illinois and Indiana sesquicentennial commissions, and such authors as Howard K. Beale and Earl Schenck Miers. Rounding out the collection are the manuscript and printers proofs of the *Handbook* published by the commission in 1958, material relating to their public relations and publicity programs, and a few printed items by other groups.
